- Oct. 20. Windsor. Henry de Ferariis, staying in England, has letters nominating Henry de Lucy and Henry Coulok his attorneys in Ireland for two years.
- Oct. 24. Odiham. Licence for Joan, late the wife of Henry de Campo Arnulphi tenant in chief, to marry whomsoever she will of the king's allegiance.
By fine of 10 marks. Cornwall.
- Oct. 24. Odiham. Gift to Richard, earl of Arundell, of all goods which were in the manors and lands of Edmund, earl of Arundell, his father, in the marches of Wales, formerly granted along with all debts due to the said earl in those parts to Roger de Mortuo Mari, on the day when these were forfeited by the latter, and of debts due to the latter, to the value of 300*l.* By pet. of C.
Mandate in pursuance to the treasurer and barons of the Exchequer.
- Oct. 16. Westminster. Licence, after inquisition *ad quod damnum*, for the alienation in mortmain by Joan de Caumpe to the prior and Carmelite Friars of Cambridge, of a messuage in Cambridge for the enlargement of their dwelling place.

- Oct. 16. Westminster. Pardon to Thomas de Dakenham and Alice de Hampton of their outlawry and waiver in the county of Kent for non-appearance before the king to answer touching a plea of Roger de Reyhamme that they abducted Margery his wife at Eastcherche in the island of Sheppeye, and carried away his goods.

- Oct. 12. Westminster. Licence for Henry bishop of St. Davids to alienate in mortmain lands and rents in Wales to the yearly value of 30*l.* to six chaplains.
Vacated because above. By fine of 10*l.* and pet. of C.
- Oct. 20. Windsor. Protection with clause *nolumus*, for two years, for John de Dyneham going on pilgrimage beyond seas.
- Oct. 16. Westminster. Mandate to the escheator of the county of Chester forthwith to remove the king's hands from 240 acres of the waste land of Rudeheth, approved by the abbot and convent of Dieulacres by virtue of letters patent made by Edward I., while he was earl of Chester, and confirmed by the present king. The said lands were lately seized after an inquisition taken by Thomas Darners, then escheator, wherein it was stated that the improvement had been made without warrant partly from the king's waste of Rudeheath, and partly from their own waste, but it has since been found by a fresh inquisition taken by the justice of Chester that the improvement has been made entirely on the soil of the abbey within their manor of Byneleye.

- Oct. 15. Westminster. Pardon to John de Rue, on his petition setting forth that the taking of eels at Thurel near Rue is so deteriorated by the obstruction of the river there that it does not now suffice to pay the yearly rent of 74 pounds of Paris required of him for the eels, of one moiety of his rent for the whole time in which he has had the taking of them.

Mandate in pursuance to the receiver of the county of Ponthieu. If the same John find security for future payment, he is to allow him to retain the taking of the eels at a competent price; if not, he is to remove him from it.
- Oct. 26. Odiham. Mandate, at the request of William, count of Holland and Seland, to the chancellor for the time being, to present Peter de Colomers to the first void benefice in the king's gift, with or without cure of souls, not exceeding the value of 40 marks.

- Oct. 16. Westminster. Pardon to the prioress and nuns of Ermithwait, co. Cumberland, whose lands and rents have been very greatly wasted and destroyed by the war of Scotland, of 10*l.* due to the king for victuals bought by them in the late king's reign at Carlisle.
