On the 13rd day of August 1832 personally appearing before the
county court of Charles City Thomas Newby a resident of Charles City
in the State of Virginia aged twenty two years in January —
and who being first duly sworn avers to have made and to make
the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the
~~Virginia~~ now by the act of Congress passed the 3d June 1832.
That he resides in the State of Virginia in the State of Virginia on the
twelfth — day of August — 1777 with Lieutenant
Thomas Clay and others in the said state engaged in settling con-
cerns by Col. Thomas Marshall. The said office was at Marshall
Major Dickson, Major Maynard — was the company officer of the
company to which he was attached and Capt. Henry Davis of King
William county in the state and Lieutenant Thomas Clay. He thinks
there was a man Lieutenant but has forgot his name. Eliza Young
was the first captain of Dragoon, the name. Polley and Sisca Brown
William Shiley, Sam Blackshear Christopher Rose and Prince and
~~Cotton~~. He also thinks that he was discharge in Richmond on the 22nd
day of August 1780 and that he was discharge by Col. William
Shiley who having the honor of commanding the Dragoon Company
was signs John Mangold being Captain of Col. Shiley Company
He makes for Col. in command of said Dragoon Company and he was a
man of Charles City at the time of his discharge and he was in
those two years. He served about three of those in the Dragoon
and was at the battle of Princeton but not in the action. He has full
knowledge he was serving the Dragoon Company at Williamsburg and
York & Hampton while at York the British took Portsmouth
but he did not go to Portsmouth with Young and Brown.
In the Spring of 1780 he was marching to Petersburg from Williams-

long and copy the Rescripts at Taylors Ferry and went to Hillhouse
also by Taylors Ferry and another man called Gifford by name
in the same country of Fife who was born of Banff, about one mile from
the town of Fife where we found a box of safety. Gifford
returned to Hillhouse where we found a box of safety. Gifford
prayed and then when we were at Hillhouse. We then went
to Littleton to see work as he thinks on the way to London, but
when we got there it was not thought worth while to sweep a box
over to Littleton on August 1st another man had said Gifford had
gone to Hillhouse. He stated his talk at Hillhouse probably left
Hillhouse, Shropshire, Aug. 1st also said to be between Littleton
Hillhouse, Shropshire, Aug. 1st which with Clay has
been his known taking off from him by Aug. 1st and when
he was last seen he was in London.

He has not been seen since Aug. 1st and is now a fugitive
to his relatives every claim whatsoever to a position or pecuniary
rights the present day he claims that his name is not on the pension roll
of any agency in any state. Given to me subscriber the day and year
aforenamed.
