## Jean McGrew, D. M. Stoffregan United in Quaker Ceremony

### Friends Church Here Is Scene of Wedding

A simple Quaker ceremony united in marriage Miss Jean Elizabeth McGrew and David Miller Stoffregan of Cincinnati.

The ceremony was performed at the First Friends church here Saturday at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Miss McGrew is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen McGrew, Greensboro Rd., and Mr. Stoffregan is the son of the late Harry F. Stoffregan and Ida Bell Stoffregan of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The double ring service was used.

As is the old Quaker custom, the bride and bridegroom repeated their own vows before the assembly with no officiating minister.

Following the repeating of the vows, J. M. Parsons, clerk of the Monthly meeting and Friends minister read the certificate of marriage in accordance with the Quaker Discipline.

Rev. Leonard Hall, pastor of the First Friends church, and Rev. Jesse Stamfield, head of the Bible department at Wilmington college and former Friends minister here, spoke briefly.

The decorations were baskets of summer flowers. Miss Ruth Stoffregan, sister in law of the bridegroom played a program of organ music for one half hour preceding the ceremony. She closed with "The Lord's Prayer."

For the ceremony, the bride wore a hand embroidered batiste dress from Switzerland, an heirloom in the family of the bridegroom's mother. It was of eggshell color embroidered in a border pattern of pastel blue and green. A pearl juliet cap held a shoulder length maline veil. The bride's bouquet was white summer flowers.

Attendants to the couple were Miss Martha McClenahan of Plymouth, Mich., cousin of the bride and Frederick Stoffregan of Cincinnati, Ohio, brother of the bridegroom.

Miss McClenahan wore blue marquisette and a pink head-dress. She carried a pink straw basket filled with summer flowers.

Ushers were Jameson McGrew, brother of the bride and Ernest Mills.

The bride's mother wore a dusty rose crepe dress and a pink beige straw hat trimmed in rose and cocoa brown. Her corsage was blue delphinium. The bridegroom's mother wore a blue sheer dress with white ac-

cessories, and a corsage of pink roses.

A reception followed in the Friends church parlors. Table decorations were a pink and white centerpiece and a decorated cake. Assisting at the reception table were Mrs. Walter J. Pippert and Miss Helen Bembeisel, both of Indianapolis and Valerie and Dagne Angersbach.

The couple are spending two weeks at the Grand Teton Mountains of Wyoming. For her going away outfit the bride chose a blue and white cord suit with navy blue accessories and a navy straw hat. Her corsage was white flowers.

After July 5, the couple will be at home in Cincinnati.

The bride attended the University of Illinois and Indiana university. She took law at the University of Chicago and at Indiana. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. She also served for about a year on one of the war crimes trials at Nurnberg under Frank N. Richman of Indianapolis, a judge on one of the war crimes tribunals.

The bridegroom is a graduate of Earlham college.
