Paternal Line

1. <u>William Tindall</u>, Great, Great, Great, Great Grandfather, born about 1680. Died about 1730 or 1735, spouse unknown.

2. <u>William Tindall</u>, Great, Great, Great Grandfather, born at Broomhouse, in 1716; died about 1760; spouse unknown.

3. <u>Adam Tindall</u>, Great, Great Grandfather, born about 1737; died January 21, 1767. Married;

4. <u>Margaret</u> (last name unavailable), born about 1737; died December 21, 1781. Adam and Margaret had several children, among them:

5. <u>Robert Tindall</u>, Great Grandfather of the first generation of Tindalls in America; was born October 7, 1755; died about 1810; married:

6. <u>Mary Tindall</u>, same name, born about 1760; died about 1815; married May 29, 1787; had several children, among them:

Maternal Line

30. <u>Sir James Murray</u>, born in the latter part of the seventeenth century, at Stobo Castle, near Broughton in Peebleshire, Scotland; wife's name unknown. Had, among many children, a son:

31. Sir James Murray, born about 1715; inherited Stobe Castle and 1100 acres of beautiful farming and forest land, which was forfeited to the English Parliament following the fateful attempt by Bonnie Prince Charles to regain the throne of Scotland in 1745, and the Battle of Cullodin, where all was lost; Sir James chose to fight for Prince Charles who became a fugitive in Scotland for several months, finally returning to France; he died several years later; Sir James married; wife unknown; had several children, among them:

32. Elizabeth Murray, born about 1775; died in 1839; married: 7. John Tindall, our Grandfather, born June 22, 1800, died August 8, 1863; married:

8. <u>Mary Eleanor Charters</u>, of Chatton, born in 1811, died February 13, 1879. She and John had the following children:

9. <u>William Tindell</u>, born January 23, 1831, died in scarlet fever epidemic, November 18, 1858; buried Holy Cross Churchyard.

10. <u>Mary Tindall</u>, born October 17, 1833; died in infancy.

11. Robert Tindall, born March 22, 1836, died May 14, 1910; spent his youth at Broomhouse, then lived at Chatton Mill; took lease of Wandon Farm when the Robert Maddison's gave it up to come to Anthon, Iowa in the 1880's. In 1863 married:

12. Elizabeth Brewis, born in 1833; had one daughter, Minnie Tindall, born in 1865, died in 1953, and a son, John Tindall, born in 1867; died in January 1925; Elizabeth Brewis Tindall died at his birth and he was taken immediately to Broomhouse where he spent his entire life. Minnie married John Dryden in the 1880's and had three sons and three daughters, five of them still living at this date. Robert Tindall married the second time, on January 2, 1872 to:

13. Elizabeth Dryden, sister of John Dryden. They had the following children: Elizabeth Brewis, Annie Dryden, Eleanor Jane, Leslie Douglas, Robert, William, Kate, Adam and Francis. Elizabeth Dryden and Elizabeth Brewis 33. <u>Robert Currie</u>, of Edinburgh, born in 1770, died in 1846. In 1806 he founded the Currie School in Thistle Street, which he turned over to our Grandfather, Peter Currie, about 1840, then located at No. 5, George Street, Edinburgh; Robert and Elizabeth Murray Currie had many children, among them these three:

34. <u>Margaret Currie</u>, born February 11, 1808, educated in her father's Grammar School. Emigrated with her husband to Chatham, Ontario, Canada in the 1860's; died about 1885; married:

35. <u>Walker Murray</u>, born about 1805, died about 1880; both he and Margaret are buried in Chatham, Ontario, Canada.

36. <u>Elizabeth Currie</u>, born January 1, 1810, died in infancy.

37. Peter Currie, our Grandfather, born May 25, 1818, educated in his father's school on Thistle Street and at the University of Edinburgh where he majored in Education and Architecture. First took up work in Architecture and did some rather outstanding jobs; but his first love was teaching and when he fell heir to his father's school, he entered the profession with enthusiasm. That was about 1840; the school was removed to No. 5, George Street. are buried in Holy Cross Churchyard, Chatton, as are the sons John, of the first marriage and Robert, of the second. Minnie, of the first marriage, is buried in the Wooler Cemetery. Buried in Norham Churchyard are the bodies of Elizabeth, Annie, Leslie, Kate and Frances. The others are buried in nearby churchyards in Northumberland and in Scotland.

14. John Tindall, born July 9, 1837; died in infancy.

15. <u>Adam Tindell</u>, born September 30, 1831; died February 24, 1923 and is bured in Holy Cross Churchyard, Chatton. He was a meat packer; remained a bachelor. He commuted from New Castle to his home at Broomhouse every two weeks.

16. <u>Thomas Tindall</u>, born April 7, 1840, died in Geraldine, New Zealand in 1885. He went to New Zealand, farmed and later went into the hotel business there. In 1865 he married:

17. Jane Rutherford, of Chatton, where her father was Parish Clerk. She was born about 1842; died in New Zealand about 1900. She was a cousin of Lord Rutherford who was educated at Cambridge and won fame as the founder of the atom. Thomas and Jane Rutherford Tindall had the following children: Minnie, born in 1866, died in 1953 (?), married Robert Harrison of Dunedin, they had four daughters; John, born in 1867, died in 1932, married Minnie Cullen and they had five sons and five daughters; Thomas, born in the early 1870's, died in 1951, married Mae (name unknown), they had one adopted daughter, Dorothy M. Wellington. Elizabeth married a Mr. Reeves; they had one daughter, Edna, who lives in Port Chalmers. Another

38. <u>David Young</u>, born 1787, died May 27, 1868, our Grandmother's father; lived the greater part of his life in Stockbridge, Edinburgh where he conducted a paint and paper hanging business. May 18, 1814 he married:

39. <u>Agnes Galbraith</u>, born in 1785; died March 3, 1830. They had the following children:

40. <u>Alexander Young</u>, born April 25, 1815; died in infancy.

41. <u>David Young</u>, born October 26, 1817; died February 25, 1890. He was Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Chatton, Northumberland, for 38 years. Our Mother was his housekeeper and helper in the church from 1864 until she married in 1880.

42. <u>Agnes Young</u>, born March 30, 1819; died in infancy.

43. Jessie Young, born February 2, 1821; died at Aunt Kate's home, The Manse, Crossford, Lanarkshire, May 8, 1894. She is buried in the Currie plot, Warriston Cemetery.

44. <u>Catherine Young</u>, born August 17, 1822; died at West Manse, Peebles, May 29, 1904 (Uncle David Currie's home). About 1843 she married:

45. The Reverend James Mather who was born about 1818 and died in 1856. Catherine Young Mather married a second time, about 1860 to George Copeland manufacturer of fine china ware; date and place of his death and burial are unknown. daughter married and went to Australia; and another son committed suicide many years ago.

18. John Tindall, born August 15, 1841; was killed while riding a horse February 2, 1892. He never married.

19. <u>Mary Tindall</u>, born August 23, 1843; died January 17, 1925; was housekeeper and hostess at Broomhouse until her mother's death in 1879. She never married.

20. Elizabeth Tindall, born June 15, 1845; died about 1922. About 1877 she married:

21. <u>Charles John Walker</u>, Clerk in Holy Orders, North Meols, Lancashire, England. Was called to Dalton-le-Dale Parish as Vicar and served there all of his mature life. Died about 1906. No children.

22. <u>Isabella Tindall</u>, born April 25, 1847; died in 1910 and is buried in Glasgow. She married Uncle Robert Currie, Mother's brother, about 1877; bore two children. (See Nos. 51 and 22 in right hand column)

23. <u>Richard Tindall</u>, born June 17, 1849; died in infancy.

24. James Tindall, born January 11. 1851; spent his youth at Broomhouse; came to America after his marriage to Agnes Galbraith Currie. (See No. 49 and later reference on page 7) 46. <u>Helen Young</u>, born December 24, 1823; died March 19, 1911. She is buried in Gavinton Presbyterian Churchyard beside her husband, William Weir, who passed away in 1904. They had a large family, both boys and girls; among them were James, Bill and Alexander, who lived in Sioux City, Iowa for many years.

47. <u>Margaret Young</u>, born December 7, 1827; died in December 1832 and is buried in St. Cuthbert's Churchyard, Edinburgh. In fact, all the Youngs except Jessie and Helen were buried in St. Cuthbert's Churchyard.

48. <u>Lillias Scott</u>, was the second wife of David Young (No. 38). They were married in the 1830's. Lillias Scott was born in 1792; died July 27, 1859; there were no children from this marriage.

Nos. 37 and 43, our Grandfather, Peter Currie, and our Grandmother, Jessie Young, were married on November 13, 1843 and had the following children:

49. Agnes Galbraith Currie, born in Edinburgh, Scotland, August 18, 1844. (See No. 24 and later reference on page 7)

50. <u>Lillias Scott Currie</u>, born June 16, 1846; died a few weeks later. 25. <u>Eleanor Tindall</u>, born April 23, 1853; died September 6, 1883.

26. Richard Thompson Tindall, born March 25, 1855; learned the cabinet trade in Alnwick; in 1880 married Isabella Young of Alnwick; came with his brother James and his wife to Iowa in 1880; settled first in Marysville, Missouri; lived there until his wife died about 1893; then moved to Benkelman, Nebraska. In, or about, 1900, moved to Cody, Wyoming, bought a ranch and remained there until his son, John, WAS MURDERED on February 6, 1906; he then moved to the Southwest and was never heard of again. He married:

27. <u>Isabella Young</u>, of Alnwick, Northumberland, England, born about 1855; died about 1893; was buried in, or near Marysville, Missouri. They had one son, John Tindall.

John Tindall. born in 1881, or 1882; attended the district school; helped his father with the ranch duties; was murdered on the ranch near Thermopolis, Wyoming on February 6, 1906 and is buried in Thermopolis, Old Cemetery.

28. <u>Anne Tindall</u>, born in Broomhouse in 1833; died in Chatton, Northumberland, April 19, 1907; buried in Holy Cross Churchyard in Chatton; on December 22, 1866, she married:

29. <u>William Watson</u>, widower, born about 1830, in another Parish; they had one son, John Watson, 51. <u>Robert Currie</u>, born November 30, 1847; died in Joppa, Scotland in 1919; was buried in Glasgow. He was a representative of the Heggie Rope Company of New Castle, England for several years; married:

(22) <u>Isabella Tindall</u>, born April 25, 1847; died in Lenzie, Scotland, in 1910. She had two children: Mary (Tottie), born about 1880; married Alfred Patterson in 1904: had two sons: Alfred, born in 1907, who is a bachelor living in Edinburgh; and Robert, who died when about ten years old. Also David Currie, born in Glasgow about 1882; died in Edinburgh about 1947. He married Maude (last name not known) about 1911; they had one son, Robert, who married Polly Currie (same name as his) about 1950. They have one son, David. They live at, or near, Biggar.

52. <u>David Young Currie</u>, born September 2, 1849; died December 20, 1849

53. <u>David Young Currie</u>, born January 4, 1851; died September 16, 1917; educated at Edinburgh University; served as Minister of West Presbyterian Church, Peebles; married:

54. Elizabeth Cinnamon, born June 16, 1853; died at Duns, in the home of a cousin, Helen Weir Elliot, on January 1, 1921. born in 1867; William and his son, John, came to Le Mars, Iowa about 1890; he formed a partnership with Alex Weir, cousin of Agnes Galbraith (Currie) Tindall, and seemed to be doing well in conquering the drink habit, until his son was killed while driving cattle near Le Mars, Iowa; he started drinking again, and died a near derelict about 1910, at Le Mars, Iowa. Place of burial unknown. Elizabeth was the daughter of Thomas and Mrs. Cinnamon, of Dailly, Ayrshire; she and David were married at U. P. Chapel, Carlisle; they lived in West Manse. Peebles after their marriage; they had two children: Peter (Pat), born in Peebles, August 3, 1877; died in Glasgow, June 22, 1951; was a lawyer in Galleshiels and Glasgow; married: Margaret Kyle, of Galloshiels, in the Court House, St. Giles, Edinburgh, on March 8 1913; they had two children: Ada Currie, born February 15, 1915; lived most of her life in Glasgow; married John Braidwood Caldwell, in Glasgow, February 28, 1947; he was born in Kilwinning, Ayrshire, April 3, 1903; David Young Currie, son of Peter and Margaret Currie, born September 21, 1923; an engineer; married: Elizabeth Curran, August 6, 1954; They have one daughter, Helen Currie, born September 25, 1955, a student in a branch of Glasgow. Margaret Kyle Currie died December 18, 1947; both she and Pat are buried at Galleshiels.

Marghuerita Currie, daughter of David and Elizabeth Cinnamon Currie, born September 22, 1885, in West Manse, Peebles, died September 4, 1972 in Sydney, Australia; she married an Australian, a Methodist clergyman, June 30, 1919; he died in Sydney on February 7, 1959. Both Marghuerita and her husband were cremated and the ashes buried in Sydney, Australia. There were no children.

55. Elizabeth Currie, born September 30, 1852; died November 25, 1852.

56. <u>Catherine Currie</u>, born March 14, 1854; died in 1938. About 1876 she married:

57. <u>The Reverend John Pringle</u>, a minister of the United Free Church of Scotland, he served but one charge, Crossford in Lanarkshire; Catherine and her husband, John Pringle, had two sons:

<u>William Henderson Pringle</u>, born in 1877; was trained as an English barrister and in Economics, which he made his life work, teaching in the London School of Economics, London University; lecturing at Otago University of New Zealand, and finally becoming Principal of the Commercial Department of the University of Birmingham; he lived, during the years of his retirment, at The Meadow, Ballerno, in a suburb of Edinburgh; in 1904 he married Annie Forrest, born in 1874; died April 19, 1961. William Henderson Pringle died in Torquay, England in 1967. They had two children: 58. Jessie McDougal Currie, born in 1858; died January 30, 1924; married The Reverend McLellan about 1906; he died in 1908; she then lived alone in Sterling, Scotland; she, too, is buried in the Currie Plot, Warriston Cemetery, Edinburgh, Scotland.

Note: The Currie graves in Warriston Cemetery are No. 1, compartment T. The Young graves in St. Cuthbert's Churchyard are in the extreme Northwest corner, at top of knoll.

(24) James Tindall married Agnes Galbraith Currie of Edinburgh, Scotland, on May 12, 1880; he was born January 11, 1851, at Broomhouse, Chatton, Northumberland, England; died at his home, near Akron and Le Mars, Iowa, May 7, 1903; is buried in Pleasant Valley Cemetery, Adaville (near Merrill), Iowa. He was a farmer all his life.

(49) <u>Agnes Galbraith Currie</u> was born at the Currie home in Edinburgh, August 18, 1844; was educated in her father's Latin School, in Edinburgh; was housekeeper for her bachelor uncle, Uncle David, and was a church worker in the Chatton Presbyterian Church between 1864 and 1880, when she married. David Young was the minister of that church from 1850 to 1890, when he died. Agnes Tindall died March 19, 1935, near Akron, Iowa and is buried in Pleasant Valley Cemetery, Adaville, Iowa.

James Tindall and Agness Galbraith Currie Tindall had the following children:

59. Jessie Young Tindall, born February 23, 1881; she loved farm life and horses and was a good horseback rider; she died April 24, 1965; was buried in Pleasant Valley Cemetery, Adaville, Iowa. She married:

60. <u>Herbert Arrenenine Johnson</u>, a neighbor on October 2, 1905; he was born November 15, 1877; he was a hard-working and successful farmer; he, never-the-less, sought to improve himself by reading and by discussing the topics of the day. He died July 29, 1967, and was buried in Pleasant Valley Cemetery in Plymouth County, Iowa. Herbert and Jessie Johnson had one child:
