**OBITUARY**

Martin Hubbard was born in Indiana, Oct. 25, 1840, and died March 13, 1920, at the advanced age of 79 years, 4 months and 13 days. At the age of one year he moved with his parents to Gentry county, Mo., near the town of Albany, where he grew to manhood. August 8, 1867, he was married to Margarette St. Cyr of Albany. Soon after their marriage they moved to Waverlet, Iowa. To this union were born six children, Will J., Mary E., Albert B., Myrtle A., John A. and Elizabeth B. Hubbard. Two of the daughters preceded their father in death.

Mr. Hubbard enlisted in Co. F, 29th Iowa Infantry, serving 3 1/2 years or until the end of the war.

He joined the Masonic order in the year 1872, being raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Peabody, Kan., some years later.

In the year 1878 he moved to Marion county, Kan., taking a homestead on which he lived until 1884, moving thence to Barton county, where he lived until the year 1891, then moved to Kingfisher, Okla., living there until September, 1919, when he moved to Hinton, where he resided at the time of his death.

Mr. Hubbard was a member of G. A. R. Post at Peabody, Kan., and later of Kingfisher Post at Kingfisher, Okla.

Near the age of 18 he was converted and united with the M. E. church. In 1878 he united with the Christian church near Peabody, Kan.

Those left to mourn his loss are his wife, 2 sons, 2 daughters, 22 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren, besides 2 brothers and 3 sisters.
