Midleborough, Eaft Precinct. Friday, July 5. Laft Wednefday Morning, a little after Break of Day, Deceafed Here, Samuel Prince Eiq; one of His Majafty's Juffices of the Peace for the County of Plimouth, after about 10 Days Illness of a Feaver, In the Soth Year of his Age; Being born at Bofton [May 1649. and his Remains were decently interred here this afternoon; of the Juffices of the County and an ancient Captain of the

Town being Bearers. HE was the 4th Son of Mr. Fohn Prince Ruling Elder of the Church of Hull in N. w-England, who was the eldest Son of the Rev. Mr. John Prince Rector of East Shefford in Barkshire in England, in the Reign of K James I. and K Charles I. Of whom there was this Remarkable -- That the' He was one of the Conforming Puritant of those Days, who greatly long'd for a farther Reformation, and had Married Elizabeth a Daughter of Dr. Tolderbury D. D. of Oxford, by whom He had 4 Sons and 7 Daughters that all grew up; yet every one of the Children proved Consciencious Nonconformists even while their Parents lived, but without any Breach of Amiry or Affection. And thus they continued pretty near together till the furious and cruel Arch Bishop Laud dispers'd them, and drove their eldeft Son with fo many others into this Country in the Early times of the Maffachusers Colony. Where, though He was a young Gentleman of a liberal Education, having studied at the University of Oxford 2 or 3 Years; yet thinking He had not made sufficient Progress in Learning for the Ministry, He applied Himself to Husbandry, Married Mrs. Alice Honor, by whom He had 7 Sons and 2 Daughters, and Died August 16. 1676 in the 66th Year of his Age, greatly lamented. The Sons as they grew up, took to Sea. John the eldeft died at Mull, Joseph at Quebeck, Job was loft in the Channel of England, Benjamin died at Jamaica, Ifaac at Boffon, and Thomas the

youngeft, at Barbadoes. Samuel, First liv'd at Hull : in 1674 Married Martha a Daugheur of Mr. William Barftow of Seituate, and by Her had 3 Sons and 2 Daughters. He first went a Coasting, and then applied Himself to Domestick Trade and Merchandize. In 1686, He Married Mercy a Daughter of the late Honourable Thomas Hinckley Esq, Governour of Plimouth Colony, Removed to Sand-wich, and by Her had 7 Sons and 3 Daughters there. Of the first Wife, one Daughter only now furvives, Married to Ezra Bourn Efq; of Sandwich: of the 2d, the 3 Daughters and 4 of the Sons with their Mother survive Him; and there are Thirty of his Offspring new living in 1710 He remov'd to Rochefter, where the cheif Part of his Estate lay; and for these 2 Towns fueceffively, has ferv'd as Representative in the Great and General Court fince the Revolution 19 times; and was oftener choien, when He excus'd Himfelf from ferving. He was healthy and firong in Body, of a vigorous and active Spirit, of a thoughtful and penetrating Mind, religious from his Youth, much improved in Scripture Knowledge, efteemed for his Abilities and Gifts and especially his Powers of arguing : a zealous Lover and Afferter of the New english Principles & Liberties, with Charity to others: of a Public Spirit, of an open Heart, of an inftructive Conversation, of ftrict Integrity : a very affectionate Husband and Father : in his former Years, pretty severe in Governing his Family; of later, rul'd them with groat Eafe & Gentlenefs It 1713. He came with his Confort to sojourn under the Roof of the Rev. Mr. Thacher Pastor of this Precinct, who is Married to one of their Daughters, and Here He made his Exit. Hi died in Hope of a Glorious Resurrection. He had the Quickness of his Senies and Apprehension to a few Hours before He ex pired. And as He uled to express his Defire to have his Body laid with that of his dear fon Enech, an extraordinary pious knowing and industrious Youth, who coming over on a visi died Here on August 31. 1712. Æt. 23. It was laid by the fid of that of his beloved Son, between and under the shade of pretty tall Oaks at the Woftern End of the New Burying Place to Sleep together in the fame large Grave.
