An interview with: Chris Weston-987, Sussex Team Leader

1. When did you join the England Project?

Ah, I guess that was only in April of this year, having been a little spooked by the tangerine coloured warning messages when saving pre-1700 profiles. But, I'd been thinking about joining up ever since receiving a prompt from Gillian Thomas the previous November, especially since my research into my patrilineal line of descent, as source material for a family history book, was pretty much done and I was feeling more open to doing work for the WikiTree community in general.

What is your current role, and what does that entail?

I'm the team leader for Sussex: I revise our team pages and try to keep us up to date with implementing new features agreed within the England project (like changes to categorisation structures), whilst providing support for anyone interested in working on Sussex related profiles and coordinating improvements to existing profiles. I have a brilliant team, though, who frequently pick up our tasks before I have time to do anything about them, and I just try to keep us communicating and focused on the various topics that we're targeting. Just now, we're looking at an helpful new list of Sussex profiles in need to better sourcing, provided by the wonderful Aleš Trtnik.

2. What do you enjoy most about the project?

I'm hugely impressed by the dynamism of the England Project at the moment: there is so much going on and I'm always fascinated to catch up on the latest topic of debate. I'm very excited by the prospect of not just one, but two project meet-ups being organised for next year! I think I'm a bit quiet myself, preferring to beaver away on relatively easy improvements to 19th century profiles in the county, but even then it's great to feel that the work I'm doing has direction and is appreciated.

3. Is there a particular area of the project that you've worked on that you're proud of? I'm proud of *all* the things the Sussex Team has done. I think everyone really does try very hard "to make all Sussex profiles the best that they can be". Of course, that's not a personal accomplishment and I think that's just the way it needs to be, because the overall goal of WikiTree as a single, universal family tree, may be aided by heroic single contributions, but will only be achieved through the magic of teamwork.

4. What are your hopes for the future of the England Project?

I would like to see the enormous skills of our (and other) project members inspiring and guiding the entire membership towards higher quality profiles. I hope that the sadly, relatively small amount of profile improvement that we are able to do is having some impact through leading by example. I have much greater hopes, though, of initiatives such as the excellent Orphans Trail. Perhaps we should consider extending the goals of all our projects to recognise a duty towards education as well as the pursuit of more tangible objectives.

5. Do you have any words of advice for other members?

Yeah, "Don't be dismayed by the scale of our ambitious and wonderful project!" I let myself get quit disheartened by a G2G question the other week that was headed "The Tree is not getting enough input.". It took me a while to realise that the important question for this project is not "Are we nearly there yet?", but "Is what we're achieving worthwhile?" and, reviewing my own personal experience of the project, the answer for me has to be a resounding "Yes!"
